Recent Events:

Rainbow class visited The Sealife Centre, Weymouth as part of their summer learning. They had a wonderful time and were very excited to tell of all they had seen on their return. Wildfire and Tornado visited the Museum of Somerset last week to find out more about the Romans and their local influence. They were fascinated to see the 'Shapwick Hoard' - over 9,000 Roman coins which had been buried in a field. It was fascinating to see the children making links between modern day and the legacy the Romas have left for us. They examined real artifacts and had opportunities to think like 'archaeologists' looking for clues to help them discern what these objects were and who might have owned them.

We also celebrate our preschool children who will be starting school in September. I know the preschool staff are so proud of them all and the progress they have made in their time here. There will a celebration held in the garden on Tuesday 22nd of July at 2.00pm. We look forward to seeing preschool parents and guardians there to share in this special day.

Talent Show:

We will be holding an end of term talent show which the children are encouraged to take part in. This will be in the last week of term and is an opportunity for the children to perform a special skill or talent in front of the school. This can be any talent from traditional singing or dancing to magic, juggling, football dribbling – the sky is the limit here! There will also be an opportunity for the children to judge if they would prefer not to perform. Participation is on a voluntary basis and I am looking forward to seeing what they might prepare for us to watch.

Goodbye and best wishes for the future:

Year 6 have been very busy this term, not only with the SATS tests but with opportunities to shine outside of school. I had the pleasure of taking a group to the Children's Parliament, where they spoke about 'Online Safety' and how they have been working as digital leaders to educate and improve this provision within school. They presented their talk and then answered questions from an invited audience. On their return, they then led the other digital leaders in a presentation during collective worship. Well done to you all!

To mark transition to Year 7, as a church school our Year 6s were invited to a moving up celebration at Wells' Cathedral. The theme of pilgrimage was brought to life by drama and music and the children were able to join with other schools in this celebration.

This is the term when we say goodbye to our wonderful Year 6s. They have been incredible ambassadors for the school and have really helped me to 'find my feet' this year – so I would like to extend a huge 'thank you' to them all for their help at playtimes, their patience with me as I asked them questions about how different areas of school are organised. We also recognise the important role they have played as sports' leaders, play leaders, buddies for the reception children and how they are an absolute pleasure to talk to and share ideas with. I know they are more than ready for the next stage in their education, as they move up into Year 7. We will really miss them all and wish them every success. We hope they might return in the future to let us know how they have been getting on.

Reading:

The summer holiday is about to begin with the weeks stretching out for recouperation with family and friends. This is important family time and we recognise how special this time is when children are young. One of the ways we can connect with children is by reading together and this is something I would encourage you to prioritise over the holidays. Reading is one of the most powerful and effective ways that we can support our children to increase their vocabulary and in turn their ability to understand the world around them. As part of our phonics training this year - a powerful fact was shared with staff which I thought I would pass on to you.

At 5 years old:

A child who is never read to has a vocabulary of 4 622 words.

A child who is read to 1 -2 times a week has a vocabulary of 63 570 words.

A child who is read to 3-5 times a week has a vocabulary of 169 520 words.

A child who is read to daily has a vocabulary of 296 600 words.

A child read 5 books a day has a vocabulary of 1 483 300 words.
